## Leadership, 10, 11, 12: Descrìtion

(Return to Board Authorized courses)

There are three realms to the Leadership class: self-leadership, leadership in the school and leadership in the community. This is an opportunity to help make things happen in your world and to get credit for it, to gain skills that will help you make better decisions and to get more out of your day-to-day lives. Since Leadership is outside of the timetable, you have the chance to still be involved in extra-curricular activities (i.e. sports and music) with on-going communication with the teacher. It is a lot of fun and it pays to make a difference.

## Peer Tutorìng 10, 11, 12: Descrìtion

(Return to Board Authorized courses)
Senior students provide assistance to junior students in the classroom or individually. Instructor permission required. Students will receive some training and there is a small paperwork component.

## Psychology 11: Description

(Return to Board Authorized courses)

Psychology 11 is a survey course covering various aspects of psychology in general. It does not concentrate study in one specific area. Some topics are: Nature vs. Nurture, Personality, Social Psychology, and Abnormal Behaviour. Evaluation is based on: assignments (including textbook reading \& questions, case studies, worksheets) and tests (quizzes, midterm, final exam). (Strongly Recommended: at least a C+ in English 10)

## Psychology 12: Description

(Return to Board Authorized courses)

Psychology 12 extends the topics introduced in Psychology 11 and introduces new areas of study. The major topics are: The Organization, Diagnosis, and Treatment of Mental Disorders, Relationship Dynamics, Psychological Treatment Methods, Applications of Psychology, The Major Project, the Schools of Psychology, and the Psychoanalysis of a Fictional Character.

## Sport Performance 10 \& 11: Description

(Return to Board Authorized courses)

This course is an opportunity for students to build on their knowledge and understanding of what truly is an athlete. The course will have 2 primary sections. One pillar of this course is to really grasp the concepts of athleticism, time management, body kinetics, training philosophies and ethics. The other pillar is the on-court activities that will be based around quality of skill versus quantity of touches. There is a responsibility/expectation for community volunteer hours built into the course. Depending on availability and cost, one end result of this course would be to receive a Level 1 coaching certification from the NCCP. If you are seeking the "whys" and the "how's" of sport, this course will offer you some of those answers. The structure of this course will be off-timetable (probably in the morning), twice a week. If there is a large student interest, a process (interview, application, previous PE marks, etc.) will be used to determine class composition.

## Yearbook 10, 11, 12: Description

(Return to Board Authorized courses)

In this course, students learn a variety of skills while engaged in an interesting "hands-on" project: producing the school's yearbook. Emphasis will be placed on the following areas: computer page layout, typography, computer graphics, journalism, photography, publishing and marketing. Classroom activity will be closely related to the "real world" challenge of meeting deadlines, producing a viable product, and marketing that product. This course will run as a linear course outside of the timetable.

## Outdoor Education 10 (PE 10): Descrìtion

(Return to Board Authorized courses)
This course aims to enable students to develop fundamental skills, knowledge and positive attitudes and behaviors to safely explore and engage in our local outdoor environment as well as providing opportunities for personal growth. No previous outdoor experience is necessary. Students will learn and practice a variety of hard and soft skills that will help them to responsibly explore, discover and foster a passion for the outdoors while discovering the recreational potential of the Sunshine Coast and surrounding areas.

Through the skill and knowledge acquired in the course students will gain greater understanding how to live a heathier lifestyle by co-existing with the outdoor environment.

The four big ideas covered in Grade 10 include:

1. Understanding our strengths, weaknesses, and personal preferences to help us plan and achieve our goals
2. Trying a variety of physical activities to increase the likelihood that we will be active throughout our lives
3. Healthy choices influence, and are influenced by, our physical, emotional, and mental well-being
4. Personal fitness can be maintained and improved through regular participation in physical activity

## Course Content:

The content of this course will vary depending on seasons and weather conditions. Topics may include a combination of hard and soft outdoor skills including:

1. Individual and group leadership skills
2. Wilderness survival (including clothing, shelter building, water, fire, food)
3. Outdoor meal preparation
4. Wilderness First Aid
5. Navigation and Orienteering
6. Trip planning
7. Introduction to a variety of outdoor activities which may include: kayaking, stand-up-paddleboarding, hiking, backpacking, snowshoeing, and bouldering
8. Sustainable outdoor practices and environmental stewardship

Field Trip Requirements (pending health protocols):
In order to make the most of and receive full credit for this course, students are encouraged to attend as many out trips as possible and are asked to attend a minimum of 1 overnight trip (2-4 days in duration) and/or 3 daytime trips.

In addition, there will be approximately one daytrip per month, which are an extension of the regular class (eg. a hike which uses lunch time plus the next class or a class that extends into time after school).

Optional Trips (pending health protocols):
Any additional trips that occur outside of the regular school day or on a weekend are optional. These trips are viewed as enrichment to the course material. Numbers will be limited to conform to safety requirements and selection on a first come basis.

Optional activities are not required but may be available through the course on a user pays basis.

Community Television Broadcastìng 9-12: Description

This course would be an off-timetable opportunity for students to get course credit for training and experience working together with Eastlink Community Television on community television broadcasting. Students would have a combination of scheduled workshops, on-assignment video journalism projects, and participation in both in-studio and mobile production unit multi-camera video productions. Students would learn a variety of hands-on technical skills by training and working directly in the industry.

## Goals and Rationale:

Our partnership with Eastlink Community Television gives Elphinstone students the opportunity to gain unique experience within the television industry. This hands-on experience gives our students a significant advantage when applying to film and television programs for postsecondary. In addition to this experience, students also are given an opportunity to engage with their community by taking part in a variety of community events. The type of experience available to students due to the access to Eastlink's mobile production unit is unparalleled by any other high school film and television programs. In addition to the technical skills students will gain from this course, the opportunity to engage with their community gives a positive sense of identity and purpose. Many of our students over the years have gone on to careers in sports media, film and television broadcasting. The skills and training students will develop in this course are easily transferable to the film industry. Students in this course will also have the opportunity to make important community connections, interacting with a diverse group of community members and leaders.

## Train in Trades: <br> (Return to Train in Trades courses)

Students must be 16 years of age and have successfully completed a Math 10 course. Students will benefit by earning: 16 credits for Graduation and possibily credits at the post-secondary level.

School District \#46 has 3 programs that are offered in a partnership between a post-secondary school and School District 46. Trade Employment is in-demand and workers earn an above average living wage. The students earn level 1 technical training while living locally and earning 16 credits to go towards high school graduation.

## Work in Trades: (Apprenticeship programs)

(Return to Work in Trades courses)

This series of courses is a career program that allows students the opportunity to begin an apprenticeship while earning a wage and receiving course credits towards graduation. One hundred and twenty hours of paid work equals 4 credits to a maximum of 480 hours for a total of 16 credits. Students secure a paid job under a certified journeyperson in that trade, and become registered with the Industry Training Authority (ITA) as a Youth Apprentice. Mrs. Gordon, SD46 Career Coordinator, will help guide the student through the ITA process.

## Work Experience Course 11 \& 12: Description

(Return to Work Experience courses)
If you would like to learn in a workplace environment receiving hands-on experience in an area you want to explore as a career, then this is a course for you!

These courses give students an opportunity to participate in, observe, and learn about the skills and responsibilities related to an occupation or career. Students will either volunteer or receive a wage for work IF the skills performed are related to their career choice while they earn 4 credits for every 100 hours at the job. ## Early Childhood Care and Education: Description

 (Return to Other Duel Credit Opportunities)This program will offer you the opportunity to take two courses with Capilano University leading to a degree in ECCE and employment after graduation. We are currently designing the program for a September start, with the possibility of further courses second semester. This is a high-demand area with a wide variety of employment and future career options. All courses count as elective credits towards graduation. ## Animation Fundamentals Citation: Description
